Grange Supports "Family Doctor" Legislation

The delegates at the 86th Session of the Conn. State Grange were unanimous in their support of State Master Pearl's program of increased training of the General Practitioner (Family Doctor).

A resolution supporting action was passed which urges the University of Connecticut to establish programs that will encourage the training of General Practitioners and to influence in every way possible the American Medical Association to raise the standing and rating of the profession of General Practitioner to the same level as other specialists in the Medical Field.

In addition, the Connecticut State Grange also supports the University of Connecticut in its plan to establish a School of Veterinary Medicine.

Resolved to favorable approve Annual Session of the Connecticut General Assembly. (This has since been approved by the voters at the November 3rd election.)

Support programs of State, Federal and Independent Agencies to deal effectively with forest insect and disease problems.

Other resolutions that were passed at the recent State Grange Session:

To support action to maintain the College of Agriculture at the University of Connecticut in its present status.

To urge and support legislation that will control the unrest and uncontrolled demonstrations at our colleges.

To support legislation to absolve the landowner of liability if his premises are used without his permission.

To re-affirm its stand on Public Act 490 in its present form that farm land may be taxed only for the purpose which it is used, farming.

To re-affirm the previous stand in support of the so-called "Cotter Plan" of no fault automobile insurance system of reparation.

Connecticut's National Winner
Takes Top Honors

The Grand Award Winner of the 1970 National Grange Cotton Sewing Contest is Mrs. Ruth Hickcox, Northfield Grange, Weston, Conn. Mrs. Hickcox's winning entry is from two patterns designed for a young girl. It is a delicately smocked dress with long sleeves and matching step-in pants trimmed with the dress fabric.

Mrs. Hickox was already a national first place winner in Class C of the contest which include garments (dress or suit) made by a person 18 or over for a person under 18 including infants and small boys.

There were two other first place winners in different categories competing for the Grand Award: Mrs. Tom Davis, Herman, Nebraska, Class A and Miss Phyllis Holthaus, Littleton, Colorado, Class B.

Mrs. Alta F. Peck, Director of Women's Activities, presented Mrs. Hickcox with a trip for two to Hawaii and the National Cotton Council awarded her a check for \$1,000.

1970 HIGHWAY ACT

With Congress nearing the end of its 1970 session, it is urgent that a 1970 Highway Act be passed so that funds will be available for continuing our national highway program.

The key to action is in the House. The Senate has already passed a bill, S 4418. The house bill, HR 19504, has been cleared by the Public Works Committee but has yet to be considered on the floor.

Following House action, the differences in the two bills will have to be reconciled in a Conference Committee, and reconsideration and passage of the new version by both Houses will be required before it can be sent to the President for signature.

We cannot over-emphasize the urgency that a 1970 Highway Act be passed this year. If this does not occur, there will be no authorization for fiscal 1972 of much-needed federal-aid highway money.

We urge each Grange, and each member as an individual, write your Congressman urging the passage of HR 19504. Their names and addresses are:

Let's Make Clothespin Angels

Old fashioned wooden clothespins make cute angels for the tree. With a ballpoint pen or a fine paint brush draw a face on the head of the pin, then cut a circle from gold or silver foil or wrapping paper and paste it on top to make a halo. The wings are cut from the same material. If you like, you can paint the clothespins white or a color before you paste on the halo and wings.

Game-Jingle Bell Chow Mein


TO BECOME AN ANGEL

To support legislation for the creation of a council on Environmental Quality.

To re-affirm its long standing opposition against the diversion of Highway Funds and to urge the passage of legislation making a Constitutional Amendment guaranteeing the highway user taxes be spent for road purpose only.

To support funding programs to assure adequate recreation facilities for the enjoyment of Connecticut citizens.

A resolution urging highway and transportation Officials to use all facilities and practices to speed up the timetable of the construction of our highways.

To leave the busing and education of its children to the individual community, except as a last resort when the community fails to consider the health, safety and educational standards of all children therein.

A resolve to oppose sex education courses in our schools, urging legislators to strongly oppose legislation making it compulsory that children attend these courses.

Support legislation to reduce the blood-alcohol content deemed necessary for a driver to be considered "driving under the influence".
